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
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

Abraham's account of his voyage to the East Indies, southeast Asia and Japan as physician on a coastal freighter. Told more in the style of fictional narrative as opposed to a journal.

Cristóvão da Costa or Cristóbal Acosta (Latinized as Christophorus Acosta Africanus, 1525 - 1594) was a Portuguese doctor and natural historian and is considered a pioneer in the study of plants from the Orient, especially their use in pharmacology. Acosta's treatise on the elephant, likely the first published in Europe, occupies pp. 320-342, and the woodcuts of the elephant are the first to appear in Europe. These were widely copied and reproduced over the next two centuries. It was also among the first works to record words from the Basque language. The text also includes bibliographical references to American products (Brazilian rubber, pages 93; pineapples, p. 266-267 with an illustration on p. 268). Chapter 68 is devoted to opium. In most cases, this is the first time these Asian species were introduced in Europe, where they were otherwise completely unknown.

A very rare book. OCLC locates 9 titles published by the Bombay Educational Society 1828-1837. The first, Anwari Sohili : a Paraphrase, in Persian, of the Fables of Pilpay, shows 8 locations in OCLC. All the others are found in 2 or fewer locations, and this one in only one: Albion College in Michigan. Not in COPAC. Not in the Carlson Collection at Creighton University. Not in the Heffelfinger Collection at Minneapolis Public.


This appears to be the last production of the press. The text is based on Croxall's English translation. A note at the bottom of the first page of the table of contents notes that it was the 20th edition which was used, i.e. the London, 1810 edition. The numerous illustrations seem to follow the format of the small neat illustrations attributed to Elisha Kirkall in the 1810 edition; at least one cut in that edition is signed 'E. Dyas scul.' These Indian lithographs are far enough removed from those in the 1810 edition that they warrant their own inspection and appreciation.

Not the first translation of Aesop into Marathi, as that distinction belongs to the 1809 Tanjore edition, which is the first edition of Aesop into an Indian language. This Tanjore edition was also likely taken from the English of Croxall, though from which edition remains unknown, and it is also illustrated with woodcuts at the head of each fable. In Tanjore edition, however, only 110 fables were printed. (See Graham Shaw's "The Tanjore 'Aesop' in the Context of Early Marathi Printing," in *The Library*, September 1978, pp. 207-14.) The

Encyclopedia of Indian Literature (1988) identifies the first Marathi edition as that of 1859.



Alexander (356-323 B.C.) devoted himself early to invading the Persian Empire and other parts of Asia which had been a part of his inheritance, liberated the Greek cities there, occupied Phoenicia, Palestine and Egypt, and in his greatest military achievement, captured the city of Tyre, from which time Persia ceased to be a military power. This edition contains a chronological synopsis, Alexander's genealogy, and interesting illustrations of ancient monuments.

The author was the correspondent and photographer for the Central News Agency on these missions whose surveys provided the data for the McMahon Line in 1914. The Abor Mission was actually a 'frontier campaign' led by Hamilton

Bower against the Abor for the murder of Williamson, Assistant Political Officer at Sadiya. The Mishmi Mission was led by Dundas to ascertain the precise extent of Chinese encroachment on the Mishmi/Abor border.



First edition of the first bilingual Vietnamese dictionary in a western language; 2 volumes in 1, 8vo, pp. [4], xcv, [1], 96, [2]; [2], 157; sectional title-pp. for both parts; contemporary calf-backed, marbled boards, uncut; a very nice copy.

In Genebril's introduction to his French-Annamite-French dictionary (Saigon, 1898) he is indebted to Caspar's bilingual dictionary published in 1877, but apparently was unaware of Aubert's work published 15 years before. Louis Gabriel Aubaret (1825-94) commanded the French vessel *Prégent* on the expedition to Cochinchina in 1860. He was appointed the first French consul at Bangkok. Widely held by the obvious institutions, but uncommon in commerce.

Bolts was a Dutch adventurer who entered the Bengal civil service and who got into trouble for private trading in the name of the East India Company. After being deported to England in 1768 he published this attack on the government in Bengal, in a series of arguments questioning the wisdom of the East India Company’s management of Indian commerce.



Willem Ysbrandtszoon Bontekoe (1587-1657) was a captain in the Dutch East India Company (VOC), who made only one voyage for the company (1618-1625). He became widely known because of the journal of his adventures that was published in 1646 under the title *Journael ofte gedenckwaerdige beschrijvinge van de Oost-Indische*. In 1618 Bontekoe enlisted in the service of the Dutch East India Company. On a voyage to Java he was shipwrecked, along with part of his crew, and continued in a lifeboat. After a grueling journey, including an attack by hostile natives on Sumatra, they reached Batavia on Java. Bontekoe was given a new command

and an order to harass the Chinese coast, returning to Holland in 1625.



Lust, quoting Klaproth: "As everyone knew, the dictionary had been compiled by Brollo (1648-1704) even if his name did not appear on the title-page. It can be seen that De Guignes rearranged it, translating part of the definitions of characters, though none of the compounds, into French. He does not seem to have added much."

"The Franciscan Basilio Brollo was the author of the first comprehensive Chinese-Latin dictionary, which he composed in Nanking in 1694 and in 1699, describing and translating approximately 7,000 and 9,000 ideograms respectively. For a long time these dictionaries circulated in manuscript copies, providing an indispensable tool for the first European sinol-



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ogists. During the 17th century attempts were made to publish them, but the high cost always involved discouraged publication. At the beginning of the 19th century the French government decided to publish a dictionary and in 1808 entrusted this task to C.L. Joseph de Guignes (1759-1845), former consul of France in Canton. Using the manuscript copy of Brollo's dictionary then in the Vatican Library, in 1813 de Guignes published the dictionary bearing his name, and not that of Brollo, as the author. Thanks to Abel-Rémusat, and to J. Klaproth, the fraud was disclosed and the merits of the modest friar were recognized" (Guiliano Bertuccioli, "Sinology in Italy 1600-1950," in *Europe Studies China* (1995), pp. 69-70).

American missionaries first arrived among the Karen tribes in 1828. It was apparently impracticable for them to set up a printing-press in the wild country of the Shan states, but they did so several hundred miles farther south, at Tavoy. The Karen are were one of the chief tribes of Burma, supposed to be descendants of Chinese tribes driven southwards, ultimately from Mongolian lands. The Karen language is tonal, and belongs to the Siamese-Chinese branch of the Indo-Chinese family.

The first book of the press appears to be Jonathan Wade's unfinished Karen dictionary (Tavoy ca. 1842-44). In 1843 Francis Mason published a New Testament printed at the same press, and in 1846 the Rev. Cephias Bennett published there *An Anglo-Karen Vocabulary*, the same year as this Karen grammar by Mason.

Lambert, described by Dalhousie in a private letter as the "combustible commodore," eventually provoked a naval confrontation in extremely questionable circumstances by blockading the port of Rangoon and seizing the King Pagan's royal ship and thus started the Second Anglo-Burmese War which ended in the Company annexing the province of Pegu and renaming it Lower Burma ... 

Walter Henry Medhurst (1796-1857) was an English missionary who served an apprenticeship in the printing trade before joining the Missionary Society. He was sent to Malacca in 1817 where he spent almost 20 years doing Protestant missionary work in what is now Indonesia. It was in Batavia (Jakarta) that he printed on his lithographic press the first English-Japanese dictionary in 1830. After the Opium War he moved to Shanghai in order to assist in a translation of the New Testament into Chinese, and remained in China until his return to England in 1856.

Medhurst's long career in the Far East made him familiar not only with Malay and

Chinese, but also with Japanese, and he is not only one of the most reliable, but also one of the most informed of the Western sinologists. He also went on to publish a Chinese dictionary and conversation book.



In his introduction to the English language edition Perckhammer states, "Pictures of nude women, setting aside the ugly caricatures of the "Spring pictures" of erotic scenes, simply do not exist in China. Therefore I believe, I have created something entirely new and of value," and indeed we have seen few if any such books appear ourselves. The book was later banned by the Nazis under their list

of harmful and undesirable writings.

the country as it was before the foreigners arrived in force. Upon his return to New York in 1855 he published several books: a collection of prints entitled *Graphic Scenes of the Japan Expedition*; and the 400 sketches which were included in Perry's official report, as well as his memoirs, *Reiss um die Welt nach Japan* (Leipzig, 1856).

The dust jacket, never seen by any Japanese dealer or librarian that I've consulted, is unusual in that it is a jacket of Western design and distinctly different from the Japanese fukuro (sleeve or sheath) often seen on 19th-century Japanese books. I can't say this is the first Western-designed jacket made in the East but it

certainly has to rank as among the earliest extant. The front panel repeats the design of the title page but within a ruled border with fleurs-de-lys in the corners, and the spine, with red rules simulating spine bands, is in 5 compartments, with red lettering printed in 3. The inside of the jacket contains pockets of marbled paper into which the covers of the dictionary are meant to slip.

The dictionary itself is arranged phonetically according to the Roman alphabet, followed by the pronunciation in Katakana and the Chinese characters. With the exception of Medhurst's small vocabulary issued at Batavia in 1830, Hepburn's work was the first true Japanese - English dictionary (first edition 1867) to be sold in Japan. In the third edition, published in 1886, Hepburn adopted a new system for romanization of the Japanese language developed by the Society for the Romanization of the Japanese Alphabet (Rōmajikai). This system is widely known as the Hepburn romanization because Hepburn's dictionary popularized it. This is Hepburn's final text. Later editions were mere reprints.

Hepburn (1815-1911), an American Presbyterian medical missionary, was among the earliest in Japan after the opening of its borders in 1859, and subsequently became one of Japan's leading citizens, operating for many years a dispensary, and playing a prominent role in medical education there. He also compiled a dictionary, the first comprehensive Japanese-English dictionary by a westerner, and a standard work for better than 50 years. It was first published in Shanghai by the American Missionary Press in 1867.

Zaunmuller cites the 1903 [i.e. seventh] edition only; no copy of any edition in Cordell.



The author, "Katheryn," writes to her friend Jesse in Oregon, describing her daily routine and life in Hong Kong with her husband Tom, who works there. "Hong Kong is the most beautiful place I have ever seen. I cannot describe it to you but will send you some Kodak pictures." Her writing is rather slangy and telegraphic, but she manages to convey a sense of her life and times. "We have a rickshaw of our own now, Tom bought it last week. It is a nice one, made in Japan, and better than the ones they make here. Have two coolies so they can drag Tom up the hill. One runs behind and pushes. A tailor is making their uniforms. I chose kahki (sic) trimmed with red for them, Will also have the monogram TWH in red letters on them. People here think you are somebody if your coolies are in uniform." She goes on at length



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in this manner, explaining that the chair coolies (necessary to negotiate the many steps in Hong Kong) do not like Tom because he weighs 200 pounds. She, on the other hand, goes where she pleases. She discusses her wardrobe (all white clothing) and talks about clothing and Chinese tailors, and about friends of her husband's - other expats. She describes their rooms, a bargain at \$160 per month. Then, "Although the Plague is usually worse here in summer it seems now that there are fewer cases than there were a few weeks ago... I go through the Plague district (that is, where it is the worst) Wauchai, a suburb, nearly every day." She also talks about ships currently in the harbor, "trouble in the north" and the Hong Kong regiment. We gather that she's been married just a year, and that her husband pampers her, but that she misses her friend Jessie and is a little homesick. The first twelve-page letter was written between June 19 and 25. The second, a two pager sending condolences for a death in Jessie's family, was written August 27, 1900. The third letter, eight pages, was written in 1901. In it Kathryn talks about cameras and mentions their trip to Canton and Macao. Clean and legible.

His heavily annotated editions of each became standard texts after his death. With an unusual American provenance: each volume with the early ownership signature of "L. A. Waterman, U. S. N." Inside the cover of the first volume is tipped the note "1852-62. Lt. L. A. Waterman sailed from San Francisco to Honolulu & Calcutta on the Marathon."

Lucius Austin Waterman (1832-1895) was an acting ensign in the US Navy from 29 Jun 1863 to 13 Aug 1865 and a second time from 11 Dec 1866 to 26 Mar 1869 ("List of Officers of the Navy of the United States and of the Marine Corps from 1775 to 1900" by Edward W. Callahan, 1969). The U. S. Navy holds a letter written by Waterman after his first three years of service in which he states he served in the Volunteer Navy from 1863-1865 and would like to be considered as an applicant for the Regular Navy. He did clearly join the Navy again

in 1866, but strangely, when looking up his name in the Navy Register, we can't find him listed under the years 1863-1865, and for 1866-1869, he is listed as an acting ensign under the Volunteer Navy.

Waterman was born in Duxbury, Massachusetts and a citizen of that state. In 1865, he was assigned to the South Atlantic Blockading Squadron. When Waterman was reappointed as an acting ensign on 11 Dec 1866, he was assigned to the gunboat Aroostook. The Aroostook went in 1866 to Asia via the Indian Ocean. They arrived in Hong Kong in 1867 and joined the Asiatic Squadron. Later, the ship would participate in the opening of the ports of Kobe and Osaka to foreign trade, and in the spring of 1869, the ship returned to Japan to protect the U.S. citizens endangered by the Japanese Civil War.

Shigeo Miyao (1902-1983) was primarily known as a manga artist creating humorous children's manga such as *Kushisuke Manyuki* ("The Adventures of Dango Kushisuke") during the Taisho period. He was born in Tokyo and studied manga with Okamoto Ippei (1886-1948), generally considered the godfather of manga. He was one of the first artists to use the word *manga* (literally, "funny pictures") close to its current sense.

"Miyao had the distinction of being one of the first professional artists to specialize in children's comics." In 1922, he began serializing a 6-panel *Manga Taro* [Comics Taro] in a daily newspaper which the following year was put into book form "just in time for most copies to be destroyed in the 1923 earthquake. In the present book he writes of the adventures of the samurai super-hero, *Karutobi Karusuke*. (See Schodt, *Manga! Manga! The World of Japanese Comics*, 1986, p. 48-49.) Sixty-three hits for Miyao in OCLC, all but one after 1948, the earliest being 1934.

Tanabe talks about the awe in which country people regard the new technology, the death of a young boy on the tracks, and ruminates on the nature of immortality and scientific progress.

The second is titled “Tokyo Streets,” 13” x 8.25”, pp. [11], [5] (blank); first leaf nearly loose; a series of essays on the virtues and dangers of Tokyo, including fire and earthquakes, with an expression of sympathy for the poor who struggle to survive there.

Both notebooks are written entirely in English in a legible hand, with references to Tennyson, Biblical scripture, and Moses Mendelssohn’s *Phaedon*. After writing about the death of the boy on the train, he laments, “Wretched are we who study in the new era of Meiji and are forced to disbelieve Immortality in its old form, by its new advanced sciences, professors of physics and psychology and of philosophy have given us knowledge at the expense of the eternal peace of mind.” The years of the Meiji Restoration were a time of rapid modernization and westernization for Japan, and in his essays here Tanabe captures the pride and anxiety of a people coming into their own on the global stage.



Yoshitoshi Tsukioka is recognized as the last great master of ukiyoe. His body of work spans the era of rapid modernization in Japan, as traditional production methods were being superseded by new technologies, and his work reflects the Japanese desire to absorb and exploit their new connection with the West while maintaining a strong Japanese identity. While the traditions of ukiyoe style and subject matter are clearly recognizable in most of his work, *Gessekai Shinzo* represents a more radical departure of the art form. Its composition and line work reflects a clear influence from Western engraving practices and composition theory as understood through the lens of the Japanese tradition. The subject matter also is an innovation. It is in some sense a wordless story, with no clear narrative, but with each image depicting the artist’s idea of what a civilization on the moon might look like. The architecture, land-

scapes, and people all seem to exist as a pastiche of Ainu, Russian, Japanese and Western (particularly biblical) culture. In a contemporary advertisement for the book in the *Tokyo Nichinichi Shinbun*, the “discovery” of these images is credited to a German scientist named “Professor Burendokon,” who made use of the observatory in Berlin to produce this account and satisfy long-standing speculation about what might live on the moon’s surface. The very first image in the book, representing the observatory itself, reaffirms that narrative, making Gessekai Shinzo an example of early Japanese science fiction. A remarkable book in both style and subject matter.

The end result of this work was the Jishin survey catalogue of temple and shrine treasures, which itself became an Important Cultural Property. This set is a product of that work, and in addition to being notable for its beautifully executed lithographs is arguably the foundational text of the modern study of Japanese ceramics.

The Romaji Hirome Kai, or Romaji Proliferation Society, was one of a number of groups who advocated for the adoption of romaji in Japanese society in the early 20th century. This publication was their vehicle for popularizing not only romaji as a whole, but their particular method of romanization, which was to be superseded soon after by the Hepburn system in 1907. *Romaji* was preceded by one other

romaji-only publication, (*Romaji zasshi*, which folded in 1892). *Romaji* lasted for 40-some years, with the last known issue appearing in the 40s. Its articles included translated literature, guidance on the use of romaji in writing letters, news about romaji adoption in Japanese colonies, and general articles on Japanese culture.

Nine institutions record at least one issue in OCLC, with Cornell only cataloging the first volume in its entirety.

himself at odds with his political fellows, and ended up a Goldwater Republican before his death. He wrote a number of political works throughout his career, this one focusing reform of the milk industry to support the development of young children. The long inscription explains the story of how Spargo was approached by the Japanese for the rights of translation, which he agreed to for six copies of the finished work, and how he was offered “some sort of Order of the Rising Sun,” but refused as his “then Socialist Comrades would have been merciless” had he accepted. One copy recorded at the University of Vermont only as of January 2015.

Baron Raimund von Stillfried-Ratenicz



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(1839-1911) was an Austrian painter, diplomat, world traveler, and a photographer of the first rank. With the help of his friend the photographer Felix Beato (ca. 1835 - ca. 1907), Stillfried opened for business in 1871. “In May 1872 Stillfried embarked on a six-weeks’ tour of Kobe and Nagasaki in order to extend the geographical boundaries of his photographic portfolio. This included a visit to the closed city of Kyoto” (Bennett). A peripatetic man, Stillfried traveled to his native Austria in 1873, and to China in 1875 and again in 1876. Also in 1876 Stillfried was joined in the business by Hermann Andersen, and henceforth the firm was known as Messrs. Stillfried and Andersen. “The year 1877 started disastrously when a fire destroyed Stillfried’s studio. Fortunately most if not all the negatives were rescued, but Stillfried’s cameras and pho-

tographic apparatus were gone. One assumes that some insurance recovery was made, but it is a measure of how successful Stillfried's business had been that within a couple of weeks the local press was reporting that on January 23 Stillfried and Anderson had acquired Felix Beato's photographic business ... From this time on ... Stillfried and Andersen would freely print from Beato's negatives ... and mix them with Stillfried's own. This sometimes makes attribution difficult, particularly with landscape views and architectural studies" (Bennett). In June of 1877 Stillfried left for San Francisco and Philadelphia, and the following year for Europe where he exhibited his photography in a number of European cities. He returned to Yokohama in 1878, at which point the Stillfried and Andersen business was dissolved. Subsequently, Andersen and Stillfried ended up in court (long story, for which see Bennett) and by 1881, Stillfried has left Japan for good. (Bennett, *Photography in Japan 1853-1912*, pp. 133-41).

Saito Katsuo was a Living Treasure of Japan, and designed a number of famous modern

Japanese gardens, including Myo-wa-en in Seattle and the rock garden at the New York UN. His analysis of dozens of extant gardens in this book provides a window into his overall design philosophy.

Ci.nii.ac.jp lists two editions in 1848 and 1852. An increase in contributors listed in the back of vol. 2 from other known copies suggests our copy was likely printed around the later date.

A famous Japanese story of the "Japanese Robin Hood," illustrated by Baido Kunimasa Gimei No Takashima, i.e. Kunisada II Utagawa (1823-1880), a pupil of Kunisada (Toyokuni III). A movie, starring the Japanese film great Toshiro Mifune, was made of it in 1960 (also known as "The Gambling Samurai") in which "Chuji Kunisada returns to his home village to find that Jubei Matsui, the corrupt magistrate, has been responsible for virtually destroying Kunisada's family. A final tragedy leads Kunisada to join with a band of rogues living in the forest in robbing from the rich and giving to the poor,

always with an eye toward avenging himself on Magistrate Matsui."

Folk stories such as this "competed with official history, and the protagonists that filled this history were outlaws such as gamblers, chivalrous men, masterless samurai, itinerant priests, and entertainers. Of all the periods of Japanese history, it was at the end of the Tokugawa Shogunate and beginning of the Meiji Restoration (1868) that the roles played by these legendary heroes reached their peak. They were written about in books, depicted in colored woodblock prints, portrayed in Kabuki, and appeared in stories and narrative ballads, becoming popular heroes deeply ingrained in the people's consciousness."

An interesting and instructive look at how the Japanese learned English in the generation following Admiral Perry's opening of Japan. 2 volumes in 1, oblong 8vo, approx. 198 french-fold pages sewn in the Japanese manner in contemporary and almost certainly original brown paper wrappers; minor working and wear, but in all a very good and striking example of a Japanese student's workbook for the attainment of English. The book has apparently been copied from American primers published by A. S. Barnes in New York in 1857, and Sargent's *School Primer*, Boston, 1859; both contain a

variety of reading and spelling lessons “especially adapted to the capacity and taste of young children. It is hoped that it will proved [sic] valuable introduction to the national series of school readers prepared by Richard G. Parker.”

Both Parker’s and Sargent’s primers were available in bi-lingual editions in the Japanese market. Might this be the manuscript from which a printer might have used to publish the Japanese editions? Throughout, the English text, which has been carefully written in ink, is often translated interlinearly in red ink with Japanese characters creating an attractive visual appearance on the page. Included are 3 pages of alphabets, simple sentences, often in rhyme (“A cart for me / to ride and see / A ship at sea / with you and me.”)

An account of a voyage through the Izu Islands, a chain of islands south of Tokyo Bay, including Hachijojima, Hidojima, Arajima, Ooshima, and Miyakejima. Apparently one of three volumes, but this trip is complete unto itself.

Apparently this voyage came as the result

of an order from the Kansei Shogunate. During this period there were a number of people who traveled at the government’s request to record geographical and cultural observations all over Japan, including Ino Tadataka who is known for completing the first map of Japan. Among these travelers was a local magistrate by the name of “Ochu” (“Taichu”) who lead an expedition in 1796 to the Izu Islands. With him was the artist Koderia Osai, and it is his art work that graces this spectacular manuscript.

The textual account of the voyage, dated April to December, 1796, is also likely his. In it he records excursions to temples (on the island of Hachijo he used the Soufukuji Temple as lodging), recounts his experiences with the local cuisines (he’s a fan of sake), takes note of the silk and weaving industry, and records incidents of family life (in one particular household he notes that there were 14 to 15 children, all of whom were hungry). He describes the flora and fauna (but not in scientific terms) and tells of fish, sea turtles, frogs, etc., as well as the local agriculture, mountains, and bamboo forests. He also has an interesting account of a family trying to fix their roof, and mentions that he can see Mt. Fuji in the distance across the sea.

He also tells of the costume of the island inhabitants, how they fix their hair, how the women occupy themselves during the day and how they take care of their husbands at night. On the return voyage a storm was encountered and Koderia recounts the rough trip back.

The illustrations include a wonderful cartographic illustration of Hachijo, the first island he visited, showing the topography, the villages, trees, a path, etc.; 2 botanical illustrations; 3 illustrations of fish; 3 illustrations of villages showing inhabitants at work and play; a rock lobster; a sea turtle being pulled and


prodded ashore by nearly naked natives; two native women (one bare-breasted) before a mirror, as well as other general scenes of the islands and the inhabitants.

The gilt Japanese titling on the upper cover has been stamped upside down. Sid Berger called us a day or two after we'd catalogued this book and gave us the story. The entire edition was bound with the Japanese text on the cover upside down. When Morris received the

book he was, shall we say, disturbed, and sent the entire edition back to Campbell-Logan where the book was stripped of its cloth cover and the error corrected. Berger tells me that only 3 of the edition still have the original binding with the upside down text: his, Henry Morris's, and this copy from the chastened binder.

The first 4-volume set of Tindale's *Handmade Papers of Japan* is one of the finest books on Japanese papermaking published. This edition expands the text and includes a number of full page illustrations, color photographs, and 7 paper samples tipped in. Forty-Four A66

This illustrated guide records the

various scenes of the pilgrimage, which was undertaken by the rich and poor alike, and depicts raucous street scenes, religious rites, court images, battles, and landscapes.

(1929). Some advertising and dinner menus are from other ships on the Nippon Yusen Kaisha Line. The majority of manuscript material appears to be Chinese, with dinner invitations listing the women invited, and the date and location of the event in Chinese with English translations along side them. The manuscript material refers often to a Mrs. Arthur E. Mayo, who was likely the original compiler of the scrapbook, with a few removals and additions over the years.

The *Kitano Maru* and *Chichibu Maru*, on which the bulk of the material is focused, were both converted into transport ships during World War II. The *Kitano Maru* was sunk by a mine in 1942, and the *Chichibu Maru* was torpedoed in 1943.

Matsuoka (1880-1946) was a Japanese diplomat and Minister of Foreign Affairs of the Empire of Japan during the early stages of World War II. He is best known for his defiant speech at the League of Nations in 1933, ending Japan's

participation in that organization, thereby isolating that country. He was also one of the architects of the Tripartite Pact and the Japanese–Soviet Neutrality Pact in the years immediately prior to the outbreak of war. Schooled in Portland and Oakland he took a law at the University of Oregon. He returned to Japan in 1902 and joined the Foreign Ministry in 1904. He was appointed to the Japanese consulate in Shanghai, and was subsequently attached to the Governor-General of the Kwantung Leased Territory, where he became acquainted with Gotō Shinpei, then president of the South Manchurian Railway and Yamamoto Jotaro, then working for Mitsui in developing the natural resources of Manchuria. He became a director of the South Manchurian Railway Company in 1922. In 1927, Matsuoka was promoted to the position of Vice-President of the South Manchurian Railway Company. However, following the Manchurian Incident of 1931, the establishment of Manchukuo and the Lytton Report to the League of Nations condemning Japan's actions, Matsuoka was drawn back into the arena of foreign affairs to head Japan's delegation to the League of Nations in 1933. Matsuoka gained international notoriety for a speech condemning the League of Nations and announcing Japan's withdrawal, leading the Japanese delegation out of the League's assembly hall (excerpted from a long Wikipedia entry).


Jane Howard, to whom this book was presented, was the sister of Jack R. Howard, president and general editorial manager of the E. W. Scripps Co. In the early 1930s he worked as a reporter and copy editor on the *Japan Advertiser* in Tokyo and the *Shanghai Evening Post* in China. Jane Howard (later Jane Howard Perkins) was a reporter for the *Honolulu Advertiser* and, after the interview referred to in the dedication, she published an editorial in the

paper on October 13, 1938 calling Matsuoka “the Saviour of Asia” and praising the Japanese occupation of Manchuria as “an economic blood transfusion.” She traveled to the Far East on Pan Am's maiden trans-Pacific clipper flight, where she interviewed Mme. Chang Kai-Shek and gave an eyewitness account of the Japanese bombing of China.

Walter Henry Medhurst (1796-1857) was an English missionary who served an apprenticeship in the printing trade before joining the Missionary Society. He was sent to Malacca in 1817 where he spent almost 20 years doing Protestant missionary work in what is now Indonesia. After the Opium War he moved to Shanghai in order to assist in a translation of the New Testament into Chinese, and remained in China until his return to England in 1856.

Medhurst's long career in the Far East made him familiar not only with Malay and Chinese, but also with Japanese. Although he never visited Japan, he set about compiling the present work from whatever sources he could find at hand. As for the quality of printing, Medhurst writes in his introduction that "the printing needs a thousand excuses; but it must be remembered that the work has been executed at a Lithographic press, by a self-taught artist, and in a warm climate, where the Lithography often fails; also that the whole has been written by a Chinese, who understands neither English nor Japanese." He also laments that there was no suitable paper available.

Medhurst went on to publish a Chinese dictionary and conversation book, but this is his first book, as well as the first book from his

amateur press.

In 1917 the U.S. Public Health Service classified clonorchiasis (liver fluke) a dangerous and incurable disease, and immigrants, primarily Chinese, were excluded from entry into the U.S. When the rule forbidding entry was first enacted it practically suspended commerce at the port of San Francisco. Starting in 1921, the Chinese Consolidated Benevolent Association (Chinese Six Companies) agreed to stand bond for any infected Chinese person to enter treatment and engaged attorney John L. McNab in the effort to fight the liver fluke regulation. Success in proving to public health officials that clonorchiasis was not contagious in the U.S. finally came in 1927, when the regulation was amended. OCLC shows only four libraries holding copies.

Jonathan Wade was an American missionary born in 1798. American missionaries first arrived among the Karen tribes in 1828. It was apparently impracticable for them to set up a printing-press in the wild country of the Shan states, but they did so several hundred miles farther south, at Tavoy, in the Tenasserim province. The first book of the press appears to be Wade's own Karen dictionary (Tavoy ca. 1842-44). In 1846 the Rev. Cephias Bennett published there *An Anglo-Karen Vocabulary*. But he was not the first pioneer to set the Karen language down on paper, for we are told that Karen was "never written till Dr. Wade, an American missionary, reduced it to writing using the Burmese consonants. The Karens thus have no written literature" (*The Spread of Printing, Eastern Hemisphere*, p. 87). This set, then, represents the first printed appearance of the body of Karen literature. Numerous philological works were also issued. Ward found time, however, to keep a copious diary and to preach the gospel to the natives" (DNB). In 1818 Ward left India in bad health to travel to Britain and the United States, returning to Bengal in 1821. See DNB.

The letters in the present volume are mostly of a religious nature, but also of interest is a letter to Miss Hope, describing the horrific conditions of women in India and asking for help in establishing associations throughout Britain and America to address the issue.



On October 20, 1944 the U.S. Sixth Army invaded Leyte and on October 23-26 the famous Battle of Leyte Gulf resulted in a decisive U. S. Navy victory. These leaflets were likely air-dropped and/or distributed to the resident Filipinos by the American forces.

1) *Don't block the roads! If you must leave your towns go across country or over trails.* Verso: *Clear the way for fighting men.* Approx. 6½" x 5". Printed in brown.

2) *Filipino patriots. American troops have landed in your area. They come to liberate you from the Japanese...* Verso: *The warriors of freedom have landed on your island.* Approx. 7" x 5". Printed in blue.

3) [Text in Japanese] = *Time is running out.* With an image of a clock-face with 10 islands that have fallen to the American forces (Saipan, New Guinea, Guam, Tarawa, the Marshalls, etc.) and Japan itself at 12:00 o'clock. Verso: [Text in Japanese] = *Why die now in the last few minutes of the war...* This broadsheet obviously meant for the Japanese forces in the Philippines. 50,000 of these were dropped November 21, 1944.



Fred R. Salisbury was a native Minnesotan, and was the principle of the Salisbury & Satterlee Co., a large furniture and mattress concern. In World War II he served as Lieutenant-Commander on board the *USS Salamaua* (CVE-96), a Casablanca-class escort carrier of the United States Navy. With exception of the last item in the list below, all these materials date from his time on the *Salamaua* prior to the surrender of Japan.

1) Significant quarto photo album, the photographs taken while serving in the Pacific, approx. 54 leaves, approx. 372 photographs in corner mounts, ranging in size from 8" x 10" to 2½" x 3½", the majority 4" x 6", and including approx. 47 official aerial photographs, many showing bombings and/or results of bombing at Lingayan Gulf (see below). The album likely assembled after the surrender of Japan. Many of the photographs are identified in ink captions underneath. Many pictures of Guam, Yokosuka, Nagano, Yokohama and Tokyo (after September 2, 1945). Also with a box of approximately 130 other similar photographs, including quite a few duplicates. Mostly 1944-46.

2) Two mimeograph bifolium programs of shipboard boxing matches; Salisbury was one of the judges and one of the programs has his round by round scorecard.

3) Eight-page carbon typescript of the "Historical Narrative of the *U.S.S. Salamaua*," likely written by Salisbury.

4) 31-page mimeograph document dated



October 15, 1944 titled "Commander Service Squadron Ten, Service Force, Pacific Fleet," regarding information for ships entering Ulithi (Caroline Islands atoll) including harbor defenses, pilots, navigational aids, black-out regulations, air raid warnings, radio communications, etc.

5) 120-page carbon typescript marked "Confidential" and titled "War Diary" dated December 1, 1944 - Sept. 30, 1945, variously signed by J. H. Griffin and J. I. Taylor, Jr. This is essentially a day-by-day narrative/log of the *Salamaua's* activities, from the last month of 1944 through the end of the war.

6) 4-page "Action Report of Participation in the Lingayen Gulf Occupation of Luzon, P.I. 27 December, 1944 to 18 January, 1945" marked "Secret" recounting the *Salamaua's* participation in the battle; **bound with:** Part II of the same, 27 pages, with 2 carbon copies of telegrams (one reading "I have been hit with something that went through my flight deck ... communications are out..." - this the result of a kamakazi crashing into the *Salamaua*); **bound with:** four parts of "Action Report for Period of 27 December 1944 to 18 January, 1945" with a carbon cover letter of transmittal by J. I. Taylor, Jr., with 12 leaves of appendix (8 being photographs or fax transmissions), and sections of 9, 14 (8 being drawings), 6, and 4 pages, the last being followed by 52 mounted photographs, 24 of them 4" x 5" showing aerial photographs of bombings, and bomb targets (with damage) and 29 of them 8" x 10" showing damage to the *Salamaua* as a result of the kamakazi crashing into the *Salamaua*. (Some of these photographs are duplicated in

the photo album above.)

7) A piece of metal from the aforementioned kamakazi. Etched into the metal are the words “Piece of Jap Kamakazi that hit *USS Salamaua* of Lingayan Gulf, Jan. 13, 1945.”

8) Seven issues of the *USS Salanaua News*, 8 January to 14 January, 1945, mimeograph, on legal-size paper, each issue one leaf (2 pp.);

9) 5-page legal-size mimeograph document titled “Composite Squadron Eighty-Seven,” and marked “Confidential,” an Escape & Evasion report on John Thomas Stock and V. H. Leinicke, Avenger pilots who were shot down 11 January 1945. This narrative continues to Stock’s rescue January 20. Leinicke did not survive the crash.

10) 24-page “Operational Plan Com-PhibsFac No. A1-45” marked “Confidential” and dated April 28, 1945; printed by mimeograph. “These instructions are designed to cover procedures to be followed at the direction of SOPA, Kerama Retto; SOPA, Western Okinawa; and SOPA Eastern Okinawa.” (SOPA = Senior Officer Present Afloat.)

11) 22 pages marked “Secret” regarding preparations for heavy weather, particularly the typhoon of June 4-5, 1945 together with a summary of loss and damage, and 2 folding Bureau of Aeronautics thermographs (i.e. early weather fax).

12) Series of 13 carbons of telegrams dated August 15 to August 23, 1945 concerning the end of hostilities, beginning with “Cease offensive operations against Japanese forces ... continue searches and patrols ... maintain defensive and internal security ... beware of treachery.” August 15 was the date that Japan accepted the terms of surrender.

13) 5-page legal-size teletype marked “Top Secret” and “Urgent” regarding the



Japanese surrender, and giving a proposed sequence of events August 26 to September 2, 1945, transmitting the texts of the three official texts of the basic documents of surrender. While I can’t be certain about the priority of these documents they must certainly be among the earliest of the surrender documents printed. The surrender of Japan was announced on August 15 and formally signed on September 2, 1945. This particular teletype has to have been composed sometime from August 20 to no later than August 25.

14) Half a foot-locker’s worth of other letters and ephemera of Salisbury’s, most, but not all after the war was over, late 1945 into the early 1950s.

Broadsheet, 11.5" x 8.5", printed in blue and red with manuscript in Japanese on verso; folds in 8 parts, worn and soiled, with a three-square-inch loss to one corner, with loss of text. A surrender leaflet that was air-dropped on Japanese forces as part of an extensive propaganda campaign. The recto states in English the holder of the leaflet is to receive safe, humane treatment and should be taken to the nearest officer. A number of variations on this leaflet were produced as the war in the Pacific went on, with separate issues being printed specifically for Luzon, Corregidor, and Leyte. This copy was not printed on the verso, where campaign specific language is usually found, and instead has 20 lines of text in manuscript that is not identical to any copies that we could access. It references Manila and Malabon and appears to be addressed to local civilians, rather than the Japanese military as was usual.

The mentality of the Japanese Army made surrender difficult for many. The virtue of giving up to the enemy rather than being captured was difficult to swallow, and many of these sorts of propaganda items address this directly, insisting that surrender is a noble action that allows the soldier to continue to serve his country after the end of the conflict. The first run of this particular sort of leaflet, with about 6 variations that we are aware of, did not apparently result in many surrenders, but when new leaflets were dropped with the language changed to "I Cease Resistance" results appear to have improved. Rare.

Such "I surrender" leaflets were dropped throughout the Pacific theater, with text insisting on the futility of continuing to fight, assuring soldiers that to surrender would be honorable and the correct decision to make, and promising safety and respect from the Allies. The text inside this leaflet appears to follow that trend, noting the high casualties and asking, "For what are you giving your life?" It also lists four important things of which to take heed; the third point is highlighted and says that they should absolutely not be holding any firearms when approaching Allied troops. This particular leaflet refers to the "Soldiers of Myitkyina" and was likely dropped around the Siege of Myitkyina in 1944.

Zhang Juzheng was the Grand Secretary of the Ming dynasty between 1572 and 1582 and served as a de facto secretary of state during that time, enacting sweeping political reforms and exerting strong influence on the Wanli Emperor. His writings on the four books served the primary source of the first Jesuit translation of the four books into Latin.
